It's hard to believe that we are once again at that point in the year where, with Jesus, we turn



our faces toward Jerusalem as he makes his way to the cross. I don't know how, if at all you are planning to observe the Lenten season, but as in previous years, we here at St Saviour's have decided to engage in a sermon series, as part of our Sunday and Wednesday worship (and followed up by the Bible Study group that meets on a Thursday evening), with this year's theme being 'Bread of Life'.

At a time when we so often think about, or indeed do 'go without', by way of giving ourselves to the Lord, we will be looking at the different ways in which Jesus feeds people (apologies to those who decide to give up something delicious this year!)

The series will begin on Sunday 9th March – the first Sunday of Lent – and will run for six weeks, exploring themes such as: bread for every day, bread for sharing, and bread for the road, highlighting how Jesus not only fed people physically, but spiritually too. From wedding feasts to eating with tax collectors to feeding thousands, people left Jesus' presence with full hearts and bellies – something which we hope will be true for you as we go through this series, too.




A short history

There is an old Jewish saying: *God could not be everywhere,* and therefore He made mothers. Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods – our human mothers – all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' – as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families – which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and, in many ways, now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.



The bread we share...

Christian beliefs and thoughts about the consecrated bread range from it being a reminder to us of the love that Jesus showed for us by and through His death,



to the bread becoming the literal flesh of Christ that we are invited to consume. Wherever the church and the people are on that spectrum, the priest is always careful about the way the bread is handled. This includes which container it is placed in to convey it after the service to those unable to attend. But what happens to any small pieces that may have been broken, like crumbs, upon the altar?


Although the altar is covered with a white cloth, there is another smaller cloth placed on top of it onto which the bread and wine, in their respective containers, are placed.


The bread is usually on a plate or bowl-shaped dish called a paten, with 'extra' bread kept on a side table – the Credence Table – in case more needs to be consecrated. The smaller white cloth is called a Corporal and is typically 12 inches (30cms) square. The name comes from the

Latin *corpus* meaning body, and this is folded in three in both directions (then sometimes starched) and ironed in such a way that when it is opened onto the altar all the folds are 'downward', so it forms a 'bowl' shape to catch those crumbs.

After the Communion is shared, the cloth is then folded back upon itself and later taken outside the building and shaken to allow any crumbs to return to nature.

Next time you are able to go to a Communion Service, watch as the priests lays up the table for the time of consecration. Perhaps, before the service, the sacristan may open the corporal and place it there. In your own home, what is so precious that you try and catch every crumb? How do you do it?





The 4th Sunday in Lent is celebrated as **Mothering Sunday**. Originally families would get together for a special service at the 'mother' church, often at the local cathedral.

Today Mothering Sunday is celebrated as a family day, a time to say 'thank you' to our mothers and to all who look after us.


If you manage to wade through all the details of the process, and understand them, it will leave you with admiration for the person in your church who has been brave enough to become the Electoral Roll Officer!

It was:

250 years ago, on 23rd March 1775 that Patrick Henry, a Founding Father of the United States, gave a famous speech at the Second Virginia Convention. He called for America's independence from Britain, saying "Give me liberty or give me death!"

150 years ago, on 7th March 1875 that the French composer Maurice Ravel was born. He was best known for *Bolero*.

125 years ago, on 28th March 1900 that the British archaeologist Arthur Evans began excavating the ancient city of Knossos, capital of the Minoan civilisation, in Heraklion, Crete. Knossos is regarded as the oldest city in Europe. It was abandoned for unknown reasons more than 3,000 years ago.

90 years ago, on 16th March 1935 that driving tests were first introduced in Britain. Three days later, on 19th March, a speed limit of 30 mph in built-up areas was also introduced, under the Road Traffic Act of 1934.

70 years ago, on 11th March 1955 that Sir Alexander Fleming, Scottish bacteriologist died. Joint winner of the 1945 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for discovering penicillin.

60 years ago, on 8th March 1965 that the first US troops arrived in Vietnam. This marked the beginning of the USA's main involvement in the war.

40 years ago, on 3rd March 1985 that British miners voted to return to work after a year-long strike over pit closures and job losses.

10 years ago, on 12th March 2015 that Terry Pratchett, British fantasy novelist best known for his Discworld series, died of Alzheimer's, aged 66.
